> After the completion of the graduated to now, the hierarchy at parking spots, NHS members were able to choose their parking spots before other students, with seniors picking first and then juniors. In the past, the tradition at SFCHS was that seniors would park in the very front outside of the school. Juniors would park in front of the circle drive, and sophomores and freshmen would park either further down, or by the practice field. Now even though not all of the seniors park in the front, the NHS members did still have the seniority to choose where they wanted their spots.

Some might view the decrease in a hierarchy as a negative thing, but it is actually a positive shift. With the increased friendliness between different grades, it decreases bullying and harmonizes us as a school. It gives students opportunities to make more friends and have closer relationships with teammates. It gets rid of the age barrier, making communication more efficient between people with different ideas and opinions. Teacher Alumni Interviews with Mr. Morrow and Mrs. Dietz: Question 1: What year did you graduate high school?

> Mr. Morrow: "1993." Mrs. Dietz: "2013."

Question 2: When you went to school here, were you friends with people in different grades, or only your classmates?

Mr. Morrow: "I was friends more with mostly the people in my grade and the year above and the year below. When I was in school, we did not hang out with people from all other grades. There was more of a hierarchy. We did not hang out with seniors, for instance, when I was a young freshman."

Mrs. Dietz: "Definitely different grades. I didn't hang out with my classmates a lot, so I had friends that were older and younger." Question 3: Were there any traditions you had to partake in as a freshman?

Mr. Morrow: "One of the traditions that I got to sidestep on two occasions, was having to sing to the seniors. The tradition back then was that you always had to sing the school song when the seniors requested you to. I did not have to do that, but I did have to pump a lot of water on the football team when I was a freshman."

Mrs. Dietz: "Yes, we had to sing the 'I love you senior' song to them whenever they wanted, and then we had to go to the back of the lunchline, and you had to park out by the practice field. In sports you had to carry towels and duties like that."

Question 4: Do you think there maybe are as much of bullies to is still as much as a hierarchy between grades from when you went to high school to now?

Mr. Morrow: "No. In fact, I think that separation between the grades, as it relates to kids hanging out with people from other grades, has almost entirely vanished. It is totally different from what it used to be."



Mrs. Dietz: "I would say no just because I know they have changed the parking, because from what I understand the parking is not really based on hierarchy. And the lunchline is a free for all thing and that definitely used to not be a thing. Yeah, I think there is definitely not as much anymore."

Question 5: Do you think that it is a good thing that the grades get along better now?

Mr. Morrow: "I do think it is a good thing. I think it is a lot more collegial. There is just no real animosity between upper and lowerclassmen, so I like the way it is a lot better now."

Mrs. Dietz: "I would not say even though there was a hierarchy that we did not get along, I think it was kind of a respect thing, so I do not know if it is a good or bad thing. I like to see that everyone is being treated nicely since I do not think seniors

freshmen as maybe you would have seen at a time when I was going to high school, but even then, I do not feel like I remember any severe cases of it."

Question 6: Overall, why do you think this shift has happened?

Mr. Morrow: "I think it's almost entirely due to social media. I think it is also due to the fact that our classes have gotten a lot smaller and we are just mixing with each other on a much larger scale. You know, it is not uncommon to see freshmen playing on varsity sports teams as well, things like that. We are just smaller and we mix a lot more."

Mrs. Dietz: "I think it is just a different time. I think to some degree technology plays a big role in it. Everything is videoed or recorded, so people are probably a little bit more guarded in their actions."
